



THE REPRESENTATION OF MODERN WOMAN IN CHETANBHAGAT'S REVOLUTION 2020

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Abstract

ChetanBhagat's Revolution 2020 presents the changing social and cultural realities of contemporary India through the lives of Gopal, Raghav, and Aarti. Among these characters, AartiPradhan represents the emerging image of the modern Indian woman. She is educated, career conscious, emotionally independent, and capable of making personal choices. This research paper examines the representation of the modern woman through Aarti's character and explores her aspirations, relationships, freedom, and struggles. Aarti's character reflects the changing position of women in Indian society, where education and career provide opportunities for greater independence and self-expression. At the same time, she experiences emotional conflicts and social expectations that influence her personal decisions. Introduction:

Chetan Bhagat is one of the most popular contemporary Indian English novelists. His novels generally focus on the lives, aspirations, relationships and struggles of young Indians. His simple language and contemporary themes have made his fiction particularly popular among young readers. *Revolution 2020*, published in 2011, is one of his important novels that deal with corruption, education, politics, journalism, ambition and love.

Their lives develop in different directions because of their ambitions, choices and circumstances. Aarti's modernity is also visible in her personal choices. She does not blindly follow Gopal or allow him to determine her future. Although she has a long emotional relationship with him, she gradually understands the differences between them. Gopal is increasingly attracted to wealth, power and material success, whereas Aarti is more concerned with emotional satisfaction and personal happiness. Her relationship with Raghav further demonstrates her freedom to reconsider her emotional choices.

Aarti is also emotionally independent. She experiences love, confusion, disappointment and uncertainty, but she does not completely surrender her identity to her relationships. Gopal interprets the incident as an expression of love, but Aarti does not see it in the same way. She feels guilty because she believes that she has been unfaithful to Raghav. In one important conversation, Aarti tells Gopal that she wants him to listen rather than impose his interpretation of the situation on her. She explains the unequal emotional position within relationships and also discusses the pressure she receives from her parents to marry. This statement provides an important insight into Aarti's understanding of relationships. She recognizes that emotional dependence can create an unequal relationship. Her observation also shows that she is capable of reflecting on her own emotional condition. She does not simply accept love as a romantic ideal. Instead, she understands that love can involve dependence, vulnerability and emotional power. This awareness contributes to her representation as a modern woman.

Aarti's relationship with Gopal also demonstrates her desire for personal freedom. Although Gopal offers her material comfort and security, she does not consider money the only basis for happiness. His growing involvement in corruption creates an emotional distance between them. Gopal becomes associated with wealth and power through his college business and political connections, whereas Aarti is uncomfortable with the moral compromises surrounding his success. Thus, their relationship represents a conflict between *material security and emotional compatibility*.

During a conversation with Gopal, Aarti explains Raghav's idea of creating a new newspaper. When Gopal questions whether Raghav can succeed without money, Aarti responds that "It's not money. It's the content that matters" (Bhagat, 198).

This response reveals her admiration for Raghav's idealism and her ability to appreciate values different from those represented by Gopal. She understands that professional success is not necessarily measured only by money or social status.

Aarti's support for Raghav also demonstrates that her choices are influenced by shared values. She is attracted to his commitment to journalism and his desire to bring social change. Raghav's vision of empowering youth and challenging corruption appeals to her. Therefore, her relationship with him is not based simply on romantic attraction. It also involves intellectual and emotional compatibility.

At the same time, Aarti's relationship with Raghav is not completely free from difficulties. Raghav becomes deeply involved in his newspaper and social mission, and he does not give sufficient attention to Aarti. She feels neglected and uncertain about their future. Her parents also pressure her to get married. This situation creates an important conflict between *love and security*. Aarti loves Raghav, but she also wants stability and commitment. Her emotional involvement with Gopal can therefore be understood partly in the context of her dissatisfaction and uncertainty in her relationship with Raghav.

This complexity makes Aarti a realistic representation of the modern woman. She is not presented as completely independent from emotional relationships. She understands that her relationships have become complicated and that her choices have affected the lives of Gopal and Raghav. Her guilt shows that independence does not mean complete emotional freedom. A woman can make her own choices and still experience regret, uncertainty and emotional pain.
